GIRL ACCUSES HER FATHER

Says She Prefers the Reform School to Being Compelled to Stay at Home.

MOTHER AND SISTER REFUSE TO TALK

Father Denies the Story and Insists the Girl is Inscrutable—Given Good Reputation Where She Works.

"I would rather go to the reform school at Mitchellville and be a lady than stay at home," was the statement of Della Taylor, the 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Zachariah Taylor of 205 Avenue H, when she brought yesterday afternoon from Missouri Valley by Deputy Sheriff Woolman on a warrant issued from the juvenile division of the district court. Pending her hearing before Judge Wheeler this morning the girl was placed in the custody of the sheriff.

A week ago yesterday Della Taylor left her home, making her escape from an upstairs window. The father reported her disappearance to the police, but no trace of the girl was secured until Monday, when it was learned she had gone to Missouri Valley, where she secured employment in the Oxford hotel. Following her disappearance Zachariah Taylor, the father, filed an information in the juvenile division of the district court charging her with being incommunicable. Up to the day of her leaving home Della Taylor, together with her sister, had worked at the Woodward candy factory.

The hearing before Judge Wheeler today is expected to result in some sensational developments, if the girl persists in telling the same story which she did on being brought back from Missouri Valley yesterday afternoon. She made serious charges against her father in connection not only with herself, but with her elder sister. She declared her willingness to make affidavit to these charges and to swear to an information against him.

Relative of the girl's mother, who were at the court house yesterday afternoon when she was brought back from Missouri Valley, asserted that they believed the charges she made against her father had foundation. At the same time they said the mother, who had frequently complained to them of her husband's treatment, was in fear of her life and that it would be difficult to induce her to make any accusation against him.

"If father was in jail for some time and mother away from him so that she knew she would be safe, she might be induced to tell some things," said the young girl in corroboration of her relatives' statements.

The Taylors had been residents of Council Bluffs for several years until about five years ago, when they removed to Blair, where they lived one year and then went to Missouri Valley. In July of this year they returned to Council Bluffs and had been here only a few days when Taylor was arrested charged with threatening to shoot his wife and other members of the family. At the time he asserted he had found a compromising letter written by his wife, and he finally dismissed after Taylor had paid the costs in Justice Field's court.

Taylor's wife and eldest daughter were brought before County Attorney Hess and Assistant D. L. Ross yesterday. The father denied the charges of his younger daughter and the mother and sister refused to confirm them. No arrest was made, as Mr. Hess stated he would await the result of the hearing before Judge Wheeler today.

Della Taylor, the young girl under arrest, is said by those who are acquainted with her to be a young woman of excellent reputation and character and the same is said of her at the candy factory where she worked. The father is a painter by trade.

REVIEW FOR THE VETERANS

Former Soldiers from Philippines Enter Camp at Fort Des Moines. Told by Governor at Fort Des Moines.

Edinger, an instructor in the university at Iowa City and co-edited with the United States geological survey, arrived in Council Bluffs yesterday for the purpose of making a hydrographic survey of Pottawattamie county. The survey is for the purpose of making a study of underground waters throughout the state of Iowa.

Dead Man Found at Missouri Valley. MISSOURI VALLEY, Ia., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Last night about 10:30 Night Watchman Hicks in making his rounds in the switch yards found the body of a dead man lying about fifty feet north of the main line of the Chicago and Northwestern. The man was lying on his back, near the master mechanic's office. He immediately notified Coroner Hennessey, who had the body removed to the Pottawattamie county jail. An examination showed that he had been struck by a train. Probably the fast passenger, No. 1. Undoubtedly he was killed instantly as his neck and nearly every bone on the left side of his body was broken. From papers on his person it was found that his name was F. Hammond, an employee of the "Cut-off" dredge south of town. He was identified later by friends who said that he had spent the day in town. Coroner Hennessey notified his family in Glenwood, Ia., and will send the body as soon as possible without holding an inquest.

Porter is Getting Beat. SHERBORNDAH, Aug. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—Claude Porter, the democratic nominee for governor, is billed to address the old settlers at Farragut, Friday. The date is not to be definitely announced. Thursday evening it is planned to give him a big reception in this city.

Iowa Democrats Re-nominate. CHARLESTON, Ia., Aug. 14.—Robert C. Ritzon of Monticello was nominated for congress today by delegates of the Fifth district.

Wireless System Effective. Radio Transmits Results Are Reported from Trials Made at Eastern Maneuver Camp.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Satisfactory results with wireless apparatus are reported to the chief signal officer in Washington from Camp Roosevelt at Mount Gretna, Pa. Under the direction of Captain Gibbs of the Signal corps there has been installed headquarters of a wireless system. Two other sets of instruments are also in use and are sent with principal detachments of troops when out on march or in maneuvers. From distances of ten or more miles, when the line is made, a wireless apparatus is brought out and within five minutes or less messages are exchanged with headquarters. Kites are used from these outlying temporary stations and it has been demonstrated that direct and quick communication can be maintained. The Signal corps got out with the cavalry, carrying the apparatus with them and moving at a rate which would render impossible the stringing of wires in order to keep in communication with headquarters.

By wireless communication can be had at any time with headquarters.

Colored Troops to be Segregated. LEAVENWORTH, Kan., Aug. 14.—It was stated at Fort Leavenworth today that plans are being perfected to have all the colored troops in the United States army stationed at one post because of race feeling that exists at many points where both white and colored soldiers are stationed. It is said that a southern post probably will be selected for the colored troops.

Union Pacific Agents Meet. CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—Passenger freight agents of the Union Pacific and Great Northern railroads met here today to consider general conditions and to discuss the possibility of a new agreement for future service. Another meeting will be held tomorrow.

Wheat Harvest Heeded. According to the weekly crop bulletin issued today the heavy rains of the last week or two have retarded the wheat harvest in the northwestern part of the state to a considerable extent. Grain in the shock has sprouted in some instances. The rains, however, were timely for the corn crop and in many localities kept it from firing at the root.

Hearing on Freight Rates. The State Railroad commission today gave notice of a hearing to be had September 5 at the commission's offices in the statehouse on the question of freight rates, at which time there will be taken up all petitions on the question before the board. There is a petition for a new classification on eggs in cases and for a new classification for certain kinds of furniture. A number of articles not heretofore classified will also be before the board.

Legislative Conference Postponed. The United States Senatorial convention for the purpose of furthering the movement to get a change in the constitution to provide for direct vote for United States senators has been postponed from September 5 to December 5 because of the fact that most of the delegates to the convention have not yet notified the governor of their appointment of delegates.
