CUTTING THE STREET FORCE

Council Decides to Save Some Money to Operate Sweeper When it Omits. Property Owners Insist Ditches Recently Opened by Gas Company Had Not Been Properly Rediced.

The city council, meeting as a committee of the whole, yesterday afternoon took up the matter of the neglected streets and alleys.

The hearing was held by Judge Wheeler behind closed doors. Zachariah Taylor, who had caused the arrest of his 16-year-old daughter, Della, and failed to put in an appearance in court yesterday when the girl's case was called for a hearing before Judge Wheeler.

Beyond the fact that Mrs. Taylor and her two daughters had been put through a searching examination and that the case had been continued for "thirty days or less" County Attorney Hess declined to give any further information.

The determination of the case the girl has been placed in the custody of her mother, as she expressed a willingness to return home.

People in Missouri Valley are much interested in the case and two women from that city who declared their intention of seeing the truth revealed and the young woman done justice, were in the courtroom ready to testify if called upon.

It was stated by a relative of Mrs. Taylor that she had secured a new home for herself and two daughters. It was also stated by an uncle of the girl that some interesting developments might be looked for today.

Boys Steal Horse. Mrs. Anton Flori, residing on Canning street, while attending the services at St. Peter's Catholic church on Bluffs street yesterday morning hitched her horse and phaeton along, to the close of the church.

The afternoon Sam Mackland, living near Crescent, came upon two small boys driving the rig. He recognized the horse and phaeton as belonging to Mr. Flori and, questioning the boys, learned they had taken the rig from in front of the church.

He at once took possession of the rig, but one of the boys succeeded in making his escape for the time being by running into a nearby field.

Mackland notified the authorities and Deputy Sheriff Groneweg and Mr. Flori drove to the place in front of the church to hand the employ of Mr. Mackland had succeeded in capturing the other lad and the two were brought back and locked up in the juvenile detention quarters in the courthouse.

Victor E. Bender, in describing the attractions to be offered at this year's carnival, demonstrated that he was a "spieler" all the way. He stated the carnival was to be on a grander and larger scale than ever before and took the opportunity to impress upon the meeting the fact that this year the Commercial club has charge of the street fair.
