

CURRENT LITERATURE

The Delineator for September is packed with good reading matter for everyone. The woman of fashion will find a wealth of interest in the many pages devoted to dress, millinery and neckwear; and those who are otherwise inclined may derive a great deal of pleasure and entertainment from the literary features provided in this number. Harry Pain, the well known humorist, contributes the first chapter of "The Diary of a Baby," a story that promises to be one of the brightest and cleverest this author has ever written. Every-one must enjoy the observations of this precocious baby, and follow with amusement its budding career.

The Williamsons' delightful story of a motorboat and its jolly crew in Holland is continued, and those who admire the two famous authors of "The Motorboat" will find much of them for their personal side in an article contributed by John Harvey. There are short stories by Ellis Parker Butler, Tudor Jenks, and an article of practical value on "How Not to Spoil the Hair," by Juliet Marston Lee, a specialist in this line. Housewives will welcome the advent of M. Jean Marie Devaux, a celebrated authority on cooking, as culinary editor of the magazine. A feature of special interest in this department is "The Home Dictionary," giving the meaning of the terms used in cooking and menu-making, which is to be continued from month to month, until completed, and along with a series of "Favorite Recipes of Famous People," gives a distinct practicality to these pages. The home-builder will get some splendid ideas in W. H. Wilkinson's illustrated article, "An Old House Altered," and in Alice Kellogg's article on "Furnishing the House," treating of Dressing the Bed Room and the children are stories and amusements well calculated to keep brains and fingers busy.

Octave Thanet's popular novel, "The Man of the Hour," published by Bobbs-Merrill Co., is full of surprises at once, witty, wise and graceful. Witness the following: "Nothing is so bracing to courage as company."

"It is true that I have been exposed to education, but I only took a very mild trip."

It is a long time since a book has been written which savors as strongly of the old long novels whose names have survived as "Fanny," by W. B. Maxwell. The book has aroused a discussion all over England as to whether the modern high-pressure novel is not literary degeneracy. It is only since the marvelous improvements in the printing press and the development of the daily paper that writers have really discovered this ability to turn out readable books at a high rate of speed. Who was the Spaniard who wrote 800 plays? He must have died of writer's cramp. But who would not love to be reading "Bleak House" or "Henry Edmond" for the first time? The author wrote quietly and thoughtfully in his study in Litchfield House, Richmond, Surrey, and the book bears a resemblance to those mentioned above, at least in its aspect of "literary leisure." Published by Appleton.

Max Pemberton, the author of "The Hundred Days," published by the Appletons, was asked if he could enter into the spirit of the age in which his historical characters lived. Mr. Pemberton, who is famous for the dash and vigor of his historical novels, replied: "When I wrote the episode of the duel between the grotesquely ugly man with the white cockade and Bernard St. Armand, during the latter's journey to Paris, I became so wrought up that I had to stop writing for the day at the conclusion. In writing that passage of arms, I actually made as much muscular effort as if I had been watching a jolly good game of Rugby, and were deeply interested in the success of one of the teams."

A collection has been made of the best of the fairy stories, rhymes and pictures that have appeared in St. Nicholas. These will soon be published under the title, "Fairy Stories Retold from St. Nicholas."

"The Century company has under way a new and revised edition of 'The Bible for Young People,' which is to sell at one-half the price of the original edition. It will be a large book, with twenty-four illustrations from the old masters."

The first long story which John Fox has written since "The Narrows" is "The Little Shepherd of Kingdom Come," which will begin in the September Scribner under the title, "A Knight of the Cumberland,"—one of his most successful pictures of life and character in the mountains. A northern girl is the heroine of the story, which is both humorous and romantic. It will run through the fall numbers of the magazine.

In her novel, "Where the Apple Reddeth," which is the chief feature of the September Smart Set, Edna Kenton deals in a powerful way with the subject of divorce. No social question of the day is more vitally interesting, and no recent writer has treated the theme in a more masterly way. The story is unusually dramatic and moves rapidly to its logical climax.
