CARNIVAL PLANS PROGRESS

FENCE TO BE DONE BY MIDDLE OF WEEK

Carnival Plans Embraced and Said to Be Something Entirely New— Labor Unions to Unite in Big Parade.

The Street Fair and Carnival company held an important meeting yesterday to check up on work that has been done in the way of providing for the big event that is to open September 3. It was found that practically every detail has been provided for...

The secretary of the carnival committee reported that all but three of the booths had been taken and no further effort will be made to dispose of these as there is always a call for a half dozen booths after the lists have been practically closed. The booth diagram shows that they will be occupied as follows:

Booth No. 1, headquarters of the Carnival company. At this point some members of the carnival committee will be found all hours of the afternoon and evening. Booth No. 2 will be occupied by the New Nonpareil company. Booth No. 3 will be occupied by the girls of the French Mission, who will sell peanuts and popcorn. Booth No. 4 has been taken by the Met-calf company.

John B. Long, painter, paper hanger and decorator. Booth No. 25 will again be occupied by C. Zeiss & Son. Booth No. 27 will be occupied by the New York Plumbing company.

Booth No. 31 has been taken by the Independent Telephone company, where it will make an exhibit of modern methods and appliances in telephony.

Booth No. 33 has been secured by the A. F. Wilcox for an artistic floral display. Booths Nos. 35 and 36 will contain collection of the Japanese ball game and ruby glass engravers.

Booth No. 37 will be occupied by the Central Labor union opening negotiations for the big joint labor and industrial parade to be held on the morning of September 3.

At the district court yesterday Mrs. Julia P. Barnes brought suit against John Lindner, a wholesale liquor dealer, to recover damages placed at \$10,000 for the alleged sale of liquor to her husband. According to the petition the husband of the plaintiff, who is a carpenter by trade, accumulated property valued at over \$10,000 when in 1904 and 1905 he lost all through his indulgence in strong liquor which the defendant is alleged to have supplied him with.

Etta Gilbert has brought suit against the Great Northern railway company to recover damages placed at \$1,500 for injuries alleged to have been received while alighting from a motor at Broadway and Seventh streets on May 5 of last year.

Viola Rablin seeks a divorce from William Rablin, to whom she was married in Omaha on March 3, 1905. She accuses her husband with cruel and inhuman treatment and habitual drunkenness. In addition to the divorce she asks the custody of their minor child and such other relief as the court may decide she is entitled to.

Mary Margaret Hooker filed original notice of suit for divorce from Frederick C. Hooker, alleging cruel and inhuman treatment, the particulars of which will appear in the petition to be filed today. Henry A. Schuch began suit to enjoin Ira S. Wilkins from re-engaging in the pool room business. The plaintiff states she purchased a pool room from Wilkins at 713 West Broadway and that Wilkins has reopened a few doors away in a similar business contrary to agreement.

Judge Wheeler yesterday issued a temporary injunction against Wilkins. Bird & Smith are plaintiffs in a suit filed yesterday against the real estate firm of Squire & Annis of this city in which they seek to recover \$2,500 alleged to be due them as commission on the sale of certain real estate. In a second suit Bird & Smith ask judgment against A. D. Annis individually for \$20,000 for money alleged to have been paid out by them at Annis' request and order.

W. E. Kaiser, assistant superintendent of the state industrial school at Eldora, arrived in Council Bluffs Wednesday to talk back to the institution John Hatfield, alias John Goff, who escaped from the school last April, but he returned home last evening without the youth. Young Goff, which is said to be the boy's right name, was turned over to Mr. Porter shortly after 3 o'clock Wednesday evening. As the young fellow expressed a wish to change his clothes before being taken away Mr. Kuser took him to the home of his mother, Mrs. Sylvia Hatfield, 515 First avenue. Once inside the house the boy made a dash for the upstairs and jumped out of a second story window. In the confusion that followed young Goff succeeded in making his escape and despite the efforts of the police he had not been recaptured up to last night.
