CLOTHIER IS TENNIS CHAMPION

Title Holder in Straight Sets.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 28.—The ease with which William J. Clothier of Philadelphia won the national lawn tennis championship from Beals C. Wright of Boston, last year's title holder, on the Casino courts today, was one of the surprises of the tennis year. A victory for Wright, or at lease a hard fought contest was anticipated, but that Clothier should win in straight sets, 6-3, 6-4, was beyond the calculations of even the closest followers of the sport.

Wright's playing was fifty per cent below the form showed on the same court last year, when he won the title from Holcombe ward. On the other hand Clothier displayed a well balanced game, carefully planned and skillfully executed. At the net he was like a stone wall, against which Wright hammered in vain, unable to either go around or over it. Had Wright been able to put the force into his returns that he did last year, the result might have been different, perhaps, or the match extended to four or five sets.
