LARGE DELIVERIES SEPTEMBER CORN

Updike Gets Rid of Something Like Hundred Thousand Bushels-Country Selling More Freely-No Market Monday.

OMAHA, Sept. 1, 1908.

Trade was practically nothing in the local pit today, traders fearing to hold over two days. Prices were at a standstill. Foreign news was bearish and cables were tower, and in addition to these influences world's snipments Monday are expected to be large. There was some rain in the northwest, but conditions generally were favorable for threshing.

The feature of the day was the delivery of nearly 100,000 bushels of corn by Updike, it is said to have been taken by Jaquith and Holmquist. Large deliveries had a tendency to weaken the market, but owing to light trade and the strength in other markets prices did not change much. The sountry is selling corn more freely.

Monday is Labor day, and the doors of the local exchange will be closed. Other markets also have adjourned till Tuesday. Broomhall estimates world's wheat shipments at 10,600,000 bushels.

CHICAGO. Sept., 1.—The comparatively small deliveries of wheat today on September contract had a strengthening effect on the local wheat market. At the close the December option was up %c. Corn showed but a slight change. Oats were up %c. Provisions were a shade to \$c. higher. Interest in the wheat pit today centered in the amount of wheat delivered on September contracts. Early in the day, catimates supposedly conservative, placed the amount of this wheat at 5,000,000 bushels. The difference between the estimates and the actual deliveries caused active buying of the September option through the entire session and resulted in an advance of nearly le in the price of the September delivery. The strength of the current month had a steadying effect on the more distant deliveries, which were bearishly affected by lower cables and generally favorable weather in the spring wheat territory. Shorts and elevator interests were the chief bidders for September. The market closed firm. December opened ¼6%c to ¼6%c higher at 73%c to 74c, sold between 73%c5746/14%c, and closed at 73%c74c. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 55,000 bushels, compared with 1,018,000 bushels for the corresponding day a year ago. Minneapolis, Duluth and Chicago reported receipts of 145 cars against 190 cars last week and 690 cars a year ago. Bentiment in the corn pit was bearish, but the market was held steady by the smallness of the deliveries on September contracts. News in general favored the bears, weather conditions being excellent for the growing crop and arrivals of corn at all primary points in the United States showing a material increase. For the first time in many weeks the total receipts exceeded those of the corresponding day of last year, the movement today aggregating 60,000 bushels, against 50,000 bushels last year.
