

DEMURRAGE FIGHT STILL ON

Railroads Admit Methods of Enforcing New Law Are Illegal.

SHIPPERS PROTEST MOSTLY ON THIS

Meeting Tuesday Is Not Final and Another Session Is Arranged for Next Monday Afternoon.

No definite decision was reached as to the adjustment of the differences in the demurrage charges at the meeting held Tuesday morning in parlor B of the Paxton hotel between the committee of seven appointed by the heavy shippers and the executive committee of the railroads.

The principal bone of contention between the shippers and the railroads is the taking away of the five-day allowance for unloading coal.

The meeting Tuesday was provided over by Carl A. Wright, attorney for the Northwestern. Superintendent of Transportation McNaughton of the Cudahy Packing company was chairman of the shippers' committee, and the railroad men were represented by officials of the operating and car service departments.

Discussion Pro and Con. Mr. McNaughton stated clearly the complaints of the shippers and the questions were discussed pro and con.

The annual report of the Burlington shows a real surplus of 19 per cent on common stock, but an open account for construction. The most notable feature of the report is it shows an increase of \$6,000,000 in the operating expenses and taxes and an increase of \$7,400,000 in gross.

The construction account of the Burlington is effectively concealed in the annual report just published. The Burlington in 1936 appropriated from income over \$8,000,000 beyond adequate maintenance.

The reports for the fiscal year ending June 30 of the Burlington railway, the parent company, show gross earnings of \$73,413,886; operating expenses, \$65,058,151; net earnings, \$2,758,225; other income, \$410,982; total income, \$3,169,207.

A meeting will be held in St. Paul Wednesday of the transportation department of the transportation lines to consider the private car question.

FIRST GRAIN FROM DAKOTA

Initial Shipment to Omaha is Now on Its Way. COMES UNDER RATES RECENTLY PUT IN

Tariffs Adopted by Northwestern and Milwaukee Are Pronounced Satisfactory as Whole by Secretary McVann.

The first grain ever shipped from South Dakota to Omaha, with the possible exception of a few cars of northern wheat for milling purposes, will be on its way to this city in a few days. One Omaha grain firm which has had bids out in that territory since the new rate schedule went into effect, has reported acceptance on several cars of oats and barley. Bids will be made daily in the territory of the Milwaukee and Northwestern.
