SHIPPERS PROTEST MOSTLY ON THIS

Meeting Tuesday is Not Final and Another Session is Arranged for Next Monday Afternoon.

No definite decision was reached as to the adjustment of the differences in the demurrage charges at the meeting held Tuesday morning in parlor B of the Paxton hotel between the committee of seven appointed by the heavy shippers and the executive committee of the railroads. The only tangible result of the meeting was an agreement to meet at 2 p. m. next Monday, when new rules to govern the Western

Car Bervice association will be considered. The principal bone of contention be tween the shippers and the railroads is the taking away of the five-day allowance for unloading coal. The rules of the association are practically the same since the new rate law went into effect as they were before, but under the old rules three extra days were given for unloading coal. Under the new rules no class distinction is made and every car has to be unloaded in forty-sight hours or pay demurrage.

The meeting Tuesday was presided over by Carl A. Wright, attorney for the Northestern. Superintendent of Transportation McNauchton of the Cudahy Packing company was chairman of the shippers' com mittee, and the railroad men were represented by officials of the operating and car

service departments. Discussion Pro and Con.

Mr. McNaughton stated clearly the complaints of the shippers and the questions were discussed pro and con. It developed that Omaha is not alone in this fight, as the railroads are being hammered in Kansan Oity and St. Joseph the same as they are in Omaha. One railroad, the Missouri Pacific, has already withdrawn from its position in Kansas City and issued orders for the old rules to prevail until some further decision is reached.

The extra days on coal was not the only complaint, as the shippers protest not against demurrage, but against the manner in which the demurrage law was enforced. The railroad men practically admitted that the present methods of enforcing the demurrage law were not legal and readily consented to have the executive committee of the railroads meet with the committee of the shippers next Monday to go over the rules and eliminate the objectionable

The shippers did not ask the present rules to be set aside between now and next Monday, but it is understood the railroads will not insist upon a rigid enforcement of the rules in the meanwhile.

Burlington Has a Surplus, The annual report of the Burlington shows a real surplus of 19 per cent on common stock, but also shows an open account for construction. The most notable feature of the report is it shows an increase of \$8,500,000 in the operating expenses and taxes and an increase of \$7,450,000 n gross. The large increase in expenses is said to be due to direct appropriations for maintenance of property and the equip-

The construction account of the Burlington is effectually concealed in the annual report just published. The Burlington in 1905 appropriated from income over \$8,000,000 beyond adequate maintenance. The income of the Burlington railroad is given at \$18,-083,622, taxes, \$2,018,494.; interest on bonds. \$7,863,961; sinking fund. \$721,963; other charges, \$230,454; total charges, \$10,324,884; balance, \$7,758,738.

The reports for the fiscal year ending June 30 of the Burlington railway, the parent company, show gross earnings to be \$73,413,386; operating expenses, \$50,658,161; net earnings, \$22,758,225; other income, \$410,682; total income, \$23,168,907.
