The little pickle onlone about the size of a marble are among the new things and sell for 40 cents an eight-quart basket. They are unusually fine. The dry weather recently, according to grocers, has made the midget pickles scarce and correspondingly expensive. These are the favorites for sweet pickles, but they cost just now 20 cents a hundred. The small cucumber pickles for dill or sweet pickles sell for 50 cents a one-third bushel basket. This is the time for doing up these pickles and the woman who watches the marke wagons will save spmething. Green peppers for stuffing and general use sell at 20 cents a basket. Green tomatoes will not be plentiful until the cooler weather begins to retard thier ripening, but those who \$30,000. AT THE PLAYHOUSES

"The Cow Puncher" at the Krug Hal Reid has here turned out a play that possesses more of real dramatic merit and strength than any of the long string that bear his name. This doesn't argue that Mr. Reid has developed talent for the writing of plays; he has merely shown more discrimination in the selection of material. It is vital with-the life of a day that has gone, but of whose actors a great many still linger not superfluous on the scene, but active in more peaceful walks of life. The author cleverly welds together a series of the incidents of the stirring times along the Rio Grande, and makes of the whole a play of genuine thrills, with a sustained "heart interest." with climaxes sufficiently strong to arouse the gallery, and with action of such cohesion as to hold the interest of any.
