### TROUBLE FOR R. RASMUSSEN

His Driver Gives His Name and Causes the Employer Much Woe in Police Court.

Rasmus Rasmussen, a milk dealer of East Omaha, is having all kinds of excitement at the police court these days. On the morning of September 7, John Grant, Pagar, inspector of weights and measures, stopped Rasmussen's milk wagon at Twenty-sixth and Ohio streets and inspected the measures which the driver was using. One of the quart measures was found to be one eighth short of containing the full amount and Pagar confiscated the measure and requested the driver's name, notifying him to appear in police court last Saturday morning. The driver gave the name of Rasmussen, his employer, and promised to be in court at the time set. Saturday morning came, but no Rasmussen, and a warrant was issued for his arrest and he was held before the court Friday morning. He told the judge and city prosecutor he had not sold milk for years, and when Inspector Pagar confronted him Pagar had to admit that Rasmussen was not the man he had taken the measure from and said he would apprehend the man who gave the name of Rasmussen. The charge against Rasmussen was therefore dismissed, as it appeared they had the wrong man. Rasmussen was no sooner out of the toils when he was in again hard and fast, as Inspector Woodbridge appeared on the scene and identified Rasmussen as the driver of the wagon from which the measure was taken. Rasmussen was immediately arrested again and gave bail for his appearance in court in the sum of \$25.
