FEW RIVALRIES FOR ANY OF OFFICES

Harmony on Senators and Agreement on House Ticket with Two or Three Exceptions - Primaries Tuesday.

The present preliminary contest for the selection of republican candidates for the fall election is almost unique in the fact of the absence of slates and bitter factional fights. The disposition to harmonize and get together on a ticket that will win at the poils and the desire to avoid a repo tition of the experience at the spring election, when the democrats ran away with the prize, seems to be more plainly manifested than for a long time.

Efforts to reach a common basis, took shape in conferences of the various candidates and in the matter of the sena torial ticket it practically worked itself out by self-elimination of all the caudidates except four, three being Charles L. Saunders, L. C. Gibson and B. F. Thomas, pres ent incumbents and the fourth, J. M. Macfarland.

For the house the candidates did not make much headway in the matter of reaching a ticket satisfactory to all, though a few got-out of the way before the ticket was made up and one, Beecher Higby, announced his withdrawal since.
