LITTLE WORK FOR THE COURT John Murphy Pleads Guilty to Robbing the

Pestoffice at Macedonia. SEYMOUR FINED FOR SWINDLING DEAL

No Other Cases Ready for Trial and Judge McPherson Dismisses the Petit Jury for

the Term.

John Murphy, insieted by the i-dgral grand jury on the charge of breaking into and stealing a small sum of money from the postoffice at Macedonia, Pottawattamie county, on the night of December 11, last, and whose trial was set for yesterday morning, entered through S. B. Wadsworth, the attorney appointed by the court to defend him, a plea of guilty. Judge McPherson sentenced him to six months' imprisonment in the Montgomery county jail at Red Oak. H. H. Seymour of Red Oak, who last spring was indicted on the charge of falsely representing himself to be a government official, was let off with a fine of \$100, which he will board out in the Montgomery county fail. Seymour, claiming to be government homestend agent, represented to a number of persons in Montgomery county that he could locate them on homesteams in Woodbury county. after contributing from \$5 to \$10 aplece for the preliminary expenses, discovered that Seymour's representations were false and fraudulent. Seymbur is a cripple and it s thought that he is not altogether mentally responsible and this accounts for the lenlency of the court.

After Murphy's plea of guilty, Judge Mc Pherson dismissed the petit jury. As the case had been incumbering the docket above the allotted time without being prosecuted the suit of W. C.
