**PACKET LINE INTO OMAHA**  
Report of Steamboats to Come up Missouri River.  
**CAPTAIN KIEFER OF ST. JOE PROJECTOR**  
Commercial Club is Not Advised, but Interested in the Matter Which is Reported from Rule.

RULON, Neb., Sept. 21.—(Special Telegram.)—Farmers, land owners and business men here and in the neighboring towns, villages and communities are highly pleased at the announcement that a packet line, with Joseph Kiefer of St. Joseph as captain, will soon begin operations, carrying freight between Omaha and St. Joseph.

Captain Joseph Kiefer of the cable ferry, which now plies between Belmont, Kansas, and the west bottoms of Kansas City is to be in charge of the first steamer engaged for the service. He has bought the steamer Hans, a government boat tied up at Locks 8, Omaha, near O'Connell City, and he will take his boat to St. Joseph as soon as it is thoroughly overhauled. It will be ready for operation about October 15. A large will be used in handling freight and the boat will stop at White Cloud, Kan., Hulo, Fargo, Nebraska, City and Hurd, if not all the river towns on its way, besides at stations where farmers can handily load their produce into the boat from the bank or river's edge. The line will carry all kinds of freight from live stock to baled hay, grain or coal. Farmers are jubilant at the outlook and those who wished to sell their farms because of the long distances to railroad stations are now content to keep their possessions, as they say the value of their productive farms will double as soon as this line becomes permanent. They consider it an escape from the exclusive freight rates which the prairie farmers have felt so keenly.

Captain Kiefer anticipates a large business and he says there is no reason why he should not, as there is now a packet line between Rockport, Mo., and St. Louis which does a prosperous business, with three or four boats steadily in the service. These boats get an abundance of freight to carry despite the fact that the river is paralleled by railroads on both sides. The Missouri, Kansas & Texas runs on the north side and the Missouri Pacific on the south.

The Hans, which Captain Kiefer successfully bid in, while a small boat, has

plenty of power and with the barges can easily handle a large freight business all along the Missouri river.

The Commercial club has heard nothing of any plans to run a boat or barge line between Omaha and the lower river towns. Commissioner Guild has clipped from the Kansas City papers a number of articles regarding the line which it is proposed to run between Kansas City and St. Louis and has sent them to Chairman Yetter of the trade extension committee who may bring the matter before the committee for the purpose of establishing a barge line between Omaha and Kansas City.

Members of the Commercial club have talked "boat line" in an unofficial way since the Kansas City project was started, but the question has not come up in a meeting. Lately Commissioner Guild has received letters from shippers along the river as far north as South Dakota asking the club to investigate the advisability of opening a river traffic. Henry T. Clarke, always interested in the Missouri river, has also been importuning the club to look into the matter and it is probable the subject will be considered.
