DISARMAMENT UNDER WAY

General Funston Holds Conferences with Guerra and Castella.

PRESIDENT PALMA SAYS FAREWELL

Diplomatic Corps and Personal Friends Call at Palace-Marina Are Sent Overland to Cienfuegos.

HAVANA, Sept. 30.—The work of disposing peacefully of the revolutionary forces in arms against the Cuban government is already practically under way. Brigadier General Frederick Funston, chairman of the disarmament committee, had two amicable conferences today with Generals Pino Guerra and Del Castillo, and arranged a program perfectly satisfactory to all concerned.

In fact, General Funston said this evening that the windup would be so smooth and rapid that it will take much less time than had been anticipated. The first landing of any considerable number of Americans took place tonight, when 60 Americans came ashore from the auxiliary in the harbor. This force proceeded to Cienfuegos this evening on a special train. It was explained that this movement was not on account of any actual trouble in Cienfuegos, but for the purpose of exerting a calming influence on the local mind.

The day at the palace passed quietly and rather gloomily. There are as yet no signs of Secretary Taft's occupancy of that edifice. A heavy frost covered the city last night, affecting tomatoes and all late garden stuff. Corn was not damaged.
