Return of the President Works a Wonderful Change in Washington.

DOLLAR CAMPAIGN FUND A FAILURE

Chairmen of Both Congressional Committees Admit Shortage of Cash with Which to Wage

Political Fight.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—(Special.)—With the return of President Roosevelt to Washington Monday afternoon the naional capital will again be the real seat of rovernment, in fact as well as in name. With President Roosevelt's retirement to Oyster Ray, immediately after the close of congress, Washington took on a duliness such as has not characterized it in many years. It was a dreary, descried town, Heads of departments and cabinet officers followed the president to their summer homes. Chiefs of cations, the politicians were out in the country looking after their fences and only the people who could not get away from Washington, either because of business or the lack of the wherewithal to carry them away, were the only ones remaining here. The newspaper men were compelled to stay and write what news they could of poli-

tics and other subjects in which the public show more or less interest. All this, how-

ever, will be changed when the president

comes back. Cabinet meetings will be resumed, politicians will be reporting at the

executive offices and once more the air of

Washington will be surcharged with busy activity, and that is what the president oes for the nation's capital. Dollars Fail to Come. The "dollar" campaign fund inaugurated by both political parties looking to the popularization of politics, it is conceded by the chiefs in charge of the two national congressional committees, has not been a howi-ing success. The people have utterly falled to recognize their great opportunity to pay the expenses of the campaign and as a result the rival committees have gone out on a still hunt for money. At democratic headquarters they admit that they have some money, but nothing like the money they had in former campaigns. Chairman Griggs, who is a successful beggar of campaign shekels, frunkly admits that the dollar contributions are falling off and that his mail is getting considerably lighter than it was in the beginning of the campaign. Of course the real hard campaign will not begin before October 1, but from that time on day and night the spell-

binders of both parties will be going up and

down the country urging the voters to get out and do their duty, otherwise the coun-

try will go to the "demnition how wows." Vice Chairman Tawney, of the republican congressional committee, who is in town today, said that his committee was feeling the general apathy so far as campaign contributions went, and that unless there was a decided increase in the amount of the contributions a number of extremely close districts would be lost to the republicans because of the inability of the committee to get the vote out. Mr. Tawney. however, is confident that the republicans will have a comfortable working majority can be easily handled by Speaker Cannon and which will be on hand when votes are needed. It is a fact that the majority of 112 in the present congress is extremely unwieldy. Speaker Cannon had to exert all the power of his office and even had to go so far as to threaten members with the defeat of their pet measures if they did not remain in Washington and assist by their vote in putting on the statute books the laws which will make the Fifty-ninth con-

One night in "Shoomaker's." which is a well known statemen, business men and others at the national capital. Colonel "Tke" declared himself thusly: "We've got the republicans licked to a good moral certainty unless they buy us." After the election Colonel "Ike" was reminded of his prediction and re-marked: "Yes, the republicans won because they had found money enough to buy us,"
