DES MOINES, Oct. 1 .- (Special.)-The greatest activity exists today at Fort Des Moines and preparations are being rushed for the Eleventh United States cavalry to embark for Newport News, where it has been ordered to report. Colonel Earl D. Thomas today said that he expected the two squadrons to get away from Des Moines by about Thursday of this week and he expects shortly to be in Cuba. The Eleventh rejurned from Fort Riley Sunday. Early this morning Colonel Thomas was busy with orders from Washington and lesuing orders for the preparaions for the trip to Newport News. He ordered the veterinarians to examine every one of the horses that were on the trip to Fort Riley and to get them all in shape for the trip. He issued orders for all ofment at Washington to transport

ficers on leave of absence to join the regiment at Newport News. Such officers are Captains Tempkins, Parker, Long and Lieutenants Taylor, Cooke and Cox. Colonel Thomas is making all preparations to leave Des Moines Thursday night and expects to embark immediately on reaching Newport News and to sail Saturday. Five trains have been ordered by the departroops. The trains will all be short and will be ordered to make fast time. The first squadron has been ordered to remain for post duty and will be under command Lieutenant Colonel Murray, who has been detailed in Washington for rifle inspection, but will return to duty with his squadron at once, All telegrams to and from Fort Des Moines bearing on the Cuban situation and the preparations of the Eleventh to report there for duty are marked, "Cuban Intervention," and are sent under especial rush orders. It was expected till today that all three squadone would be ordered for duty and that left in charge of the fort.
