SHIPS AND THE CANAL.

MAGOON FOR CUBA.

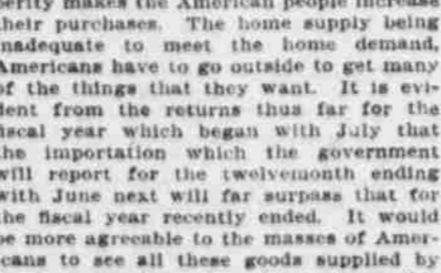

UNFAIR TO THE NEWSPAPERS. Ruling of Interstate Commerce Commission pronounced "unjust." Leslie's Weekly.

Newspapers are interested in a ridiculous ruling made by the Interstate Commerce Commission. This forbids the exchange of newspaper advertising space for railroad transportation, even when both are given at the full rate.

The sum spent for chandeliers, which reaches in all \$2,000,000, is another wholly unjustifiable expenditure. No one who has seen the elaborate, some times beautiful and some times ugly chandeliers, but will see that \$2,000,000 could be spent on them.

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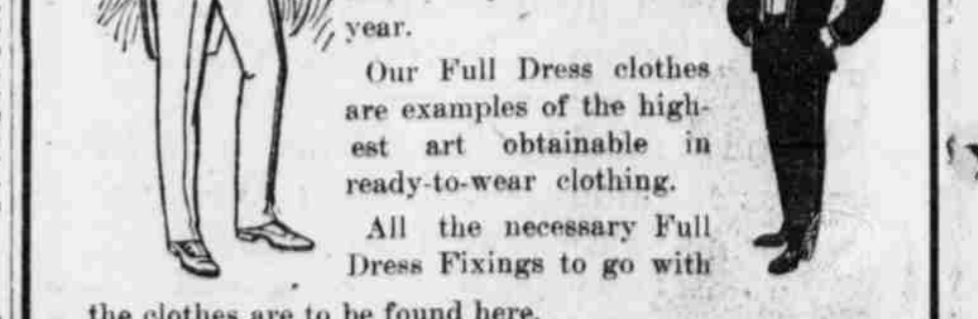
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
