#### Additional Rule Released.

CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 4.-Rules for the series of base ball games for the world's championship between the two Chicago teams in the National and American eagues, which will begin at the National eague grounds in Chicago on October 3 were announced today.

All of the rules heretofore adopted and approved by the National and American eagues will apply to the series, as well as the detailed rules adopted by the commission last year, to carry out the rules above referred to.

The following additional rule will hereafter govern in these contests:

after govern in these contests:

Rule 18—The authority of the umpires in those contests will be supreme and the umpires are authorized to eject from the game all players indusing in vile and in-lecent language and unfair tactics. Before the distribution of the prize money belonging to the players the commission will take cognizance of all reports by their umpires and inflict such penalties as they see fit against offending players and the penalties so inflicted shall be taken from the prize money belonging to such players.

#### Schedule of Games. The following details will govern the world's championship series to be played

In October, 1996, between the Chicago National league club and the Chicago American lengue club:

The schedule: Tuesday, October 9; Wednesday, October 10; Thursday, October 11: Friday, October 12; Saturday, October 13, and Sunday, October 14. (All of these games to be played at Chicago.) The first game is to be played on the National league grounds, and all games played thereafter will be alternated between the American league grounds.

played thereafter will be alternated between the American league grounds and the National league grounds.

The schedule, as adopted, was determined by lot, as is provided by the rules. If any one of the games scheduled at any park is postponed on account of rain the teams will be required to play such postponed game on the first day available after such postponement and at the same park—and thereafter again alternate between the two parks, it being the intention not to have two games played in succession at either one of the parks.

In case it becomes necessary to play the seventh game the city in which it is to be played will be determined by the commission.
