

BAR MEN ARE DISAPPOINTED

Breckenridge Says Results of Insurance Conference Are Not Satisfactory. LEGISLATION GOES BY THE BOARDS

Real Object of the Meeting is Not Discussed, but Turned Over to Special Committee for Later Action. Ralph W. Breckenridge, chairman of the insurance committee of the American Bar Association, returned Friday from Washington, D. C., where his committee held a conference October 1, with the state insurance commissioners who were meeting in convention there.

He is greatly disappointed in the results of the conference, said Mr. Breckenridge. "For the results were in fact nothing. The object of the conference was to discuss and agree on reform insurance legislation. After talking all day Monday and until 2 o'clock Tuesday morning, then again all Tuesday forenoon, the meeting was called to a close and the whole matter was referred to a committee of fifteen to meet in Chicago November 15, and promulgate reform measures. The insurance committee of the American Bar Association was invited to attend this meeting.

Two Consuming Topics. The entire time was taken up with discussion as to whether the use of a given standard life policy should be permissive or compulsory on the companies and with debate on proposed standard provisions to be compiled with in the insurance of such policy. The only action taken was to pass a motion, after long debate, advocating court review of the action of any insurance commissioner in removing from the field any insurance company failing to comply with the terms of the policy. This action was annulled when the matter was referred to the committee of fifteen.

State Form of Policy. Again, they talked of having the states prescribe a form of policy which should be incontestable for fraud after a period of

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two years. We argued that this would be placing a premium on fraud. The question of federal supervision did not come up, as it was foreign to the subject in hand.
