CRIMINAL STATISTICS OF COUNTY

Over Eighteen Thousand Dollars Expended During Year. Battey, clerk of the district court

completed yesterday the report of the criminal business in Pottawattamie county for the year ending September 30, 1906. The report has to be made out annually and ent to the secretary of state at Des present. Moines. The expense of prosecuting criminal cases for the year amounted to \$15.-25.22, while the amount paid to the county attorney and assistant was \$2,807.50. The fines imposed amount to \$1,000 and the amount of fines collected during the year was \$1,725.

From Council Bluffs twenty-two persons were sent to the penitentiary, thirteen to the county jail and fines were imposed on eight. From the district court at Avoca, three were sent to the penitentiary.
