TEMPERANCE WOMEN MEET

Triennial Convention of World's Society in Frogress at Boston.

DELEGATES FROM MANY COUNTRIES

In Addition to Business Sessions, Meeting Will Listen to Addresses of Prominent Women of World.

BOSTON, Oct. 17 .- From far-away Japan and Australia and from more than fifty other countries, in both the eastern and the western hemispheres, thousands of women interested in temperance reform have come to this city to participate in the triennial world's convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance union, which opened here today. In addition to the business essions many public meetings have been arranged, at which prominent women temperance workers from this country and
