Commercial Club Decides to Take Up Repeal of Mr. Meeker.

PLAN OF RAISING MONEY NOT DECIDED

School Children Probably Will Be Asked to Contribute Small Sums -Hundred Dollars Thought to Be Enough.

Mr. Meeker, the pioneer of the Oregon trail, met and talked with the executive committee of the Commercial club yesterday afternoon and the committee will assist in raising a fund sufficient to erect a monument in this city to mark the end of the trail. It is figured that \$100 will be ample to erect the desired monument.

Although the idea of raising the money was not decided upon at yesterday's meeting, it is likely the children of the public schools will be given an opportunity to assist, but only contributions of 5 or 10 cents will be permitted.

RAILWAY WRECK IN TEXAS. Twenty Passengers Are Said to Be Injured. Houston, Tex., Oct. 20.—A passenger train has been wrecked sixteen miles north of this city and twenty passengers injured. A special train has been sent to the scene.
