EMPEROR, EMPRESS AND OTHERS PRESENT

Letter from President Roosevelt Read, Greeting German People and

BERLIN. Oct E.—Prof. John W. Burgess, dean of Columbia university, New York, the first incumbent of Theodore Roosevelt professorship of American history and institutions at the University of Berlin, began his lectures today. Emperor William, the empress, Prince August Wilhelm, United States Ambassador Tower and Mrs. Tower, Dr. Studt, the minister of Bert Crouch and wife, accompanied by Miss Steffin, were visiting friends in Florence Wednesday afternoon.

Bert Crouch and wife, accompanied by and Mrs. Tower, Dr. Studt, the minister of education, and about fifty professors and some resident Americans occupied chairs near the reading desk in the lecture hall, while behind them were 600 students, who energetically cheered Prof. Burgess when he entered and applauded every reference to Preident Roosevit.

Burgeen read a letter from President Roosevell, of which the following is a translation:

WHITE HOUSE, WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—My Dear Prof. Burgeas: Allow me, through you, to greet the University of Berlin with the heartiest good will. The historical friendship between Prussla and the United States, and then, after Prussla had founded the German empire, between this mighty empire and the United States, has never been broken nor even shaken in the least. This friendship began is the mutual esteem and mutual good will that existed between Washington and Frederick the Great and was confirmed by the fact that Prussla alone among all the European powers showed liself willing to have trade relations with the United States during the period of uncertainty and weakness in those trying years between 178 and 178 and to make a trade treaty with us. Aiready during the colonial period of our history there was a large German element among our people. Men of German birth and German blood gave us great and glorious service during the period as leaders in war and in peace. General Steuben trained the continental army and Ruhlenberg was the first speaker of the house of representatives.

Since the revolution a continuous German immigration has taken place that has proved most important for the population of the northwestern territories.

The men of German birth and race were nearly all devoted in body and soul to the union and were extremely hostile to slavery. Through their powerful help the northwest territories were made into the free states that form the heart of the republic. We have to thank men of German birth or origin thut, at the outbreak of the civil war Maryland, Missouri and Kentucky held firmly to the union and during that fearful period they rendered us services by word and deed which will never be forgotten. The rector of the university, Prof. Kaftan, thanked Prof. Burgess and referred appropriately to President Roosevelt's message to the university and the emperor's presence and proposed three cheers for the emperor.
