

SUTTON ON JUVENILE COURT

Walls of Efforts Being Made to Prevent the Education of Criminals. CHILDREN TAKEN FROM BAD INFLUENCES

Declares Intention to Remove Every Child from the Red Light District and Its Vicious Influences.

A well attended and interesting open meeting was given by Alpha chapter No. 13 of the Woodmen of the World, at Myrtle hall, Continental block, Tuesday evening.

The story of the juvenile court is the most interesting of the past few days. There was no such thing as a juvenile court, and now twenty-two states have these courts.

Up to the time of the establishment of the juvenile court in this city and county Douglas county has paid over \$200,000 for the punishment of crime.

Formal protest will be made by Omaha jobbers to the Interstate Commerce Commission against the restrictions the commission proposes to place on merchants' meetings at jobbing centers.

Judge Burton told of a number of pitiful cases where children had been abandoned by their parents or were left to starve during the drunken carousal of their parents.

He told of the effort to have all children removed from the red light district and its influences, and of the opposition that he met from the parents of some of the children who preferred to remain there.

"Rushing the can" on Sunday afternoon by boys of 12 years was a frequent complaint. Other cases were cited where the principal Sunday dinner of one family with five children was dry bread and beer.

The other parts of the program consisted of vocal music by Messrs. Robert Gillenbeck and Mrs. McCarry, a piano solo by Miss Myers, and a short address on "Fraternism" by Joseph Cullen Root.
