Liberala Lose in Municipal Elections in Provinces, but Labor Party Makes a Good Showing in Country.

LONDON, Nov. 2-The triannial elections of the London borough councils have resulted in an overwhelming victory for the nunicipal reformers, who in some of the boroughs absolutely, wiped out the progresgives. The victors were formerly known as moderates and represent the unionist arty, and the progressives include the iberal and labor parties. After geveral years of progressive regime, during which, it is contended, the taxes were increased to abnormal figures in consequence of huge expenditures, including palatial workhouses.
