

Mary Simmerson Cunningham was the daughter of Captain John M. and Elizabeth Boone county, Missouri, August 15, 1878. She was educated in the convent of St. Vincent, Ky., and became the wife of John Vincent, Ky., and became the wife of John A. Logan, then an obscure country lawyer of mouthern lilinois, November 27, 1836. Mrs, Logan early saw in her husband the germs of a towering genius and by her loving de-votion to him and her dauntiess ambition for him and the possibilities that lay before him, she set about to build out of him one of the most striking figures of American of the most striking figures of American history. How well she succeeded all the world knows.

Upon the general's death in 1886 Mrs. Logan begun to devote herself to literature and soon reached a proud eminence as one of the most incisive and useful writers of the uge. She chose domestic subjects as her theme.




