PRaises COUNCIL BLUFFS

Officials of Army of Tennessee Pay Last Was Best Reunion Yet.

VISITORS ARE ROYALLY ENTERTAINED

Most Have Left the City and Some Say the Society Will Some Day Come for Another Reunion.

"It was the best reunion the society has held in thirty years, and we will always remember the people of Council Bluffs as royal and whole-souled entertainers," said Colonel Cornelius Cagle of Cincinnati, recording secretary of the Society of the Army of the Tennessee, while busily engaged yesterday morning closing up the records of the meeting and getting ready to leave for his home. Colonel Cagle, like the other officers and members of the society, could not say too much in praise for the manner in which they had been entertained during their short stay in Council Bluffs.

General Dodge was equally expressive in his appreciation of the manner in which the citizens of Council Bluffs had entertained the members of the society of which he is president. Mrs. John A. Logan, whose presence here was one of the most pleasing features of the reunion, said yesterday that she did not agree with General Black when at the meeting in the New theater he made the statement that the society would never meet again in Council Bluffs. "This was a mistake on General Black's part to say that we will never meet in Council Bluffs again. We never were entertained so royally, we never had a more enjoyable reunion, and we are coming back to meet here again some day," said Mrs. Logan.

By last evening, with but few exceptions, the distinguished visitors had left for their homes. General Fred D. Grant left early in the morning for Chicago. General Dodge will leave Monday for Vicksburg to participate in the unveiling of the Iowa monuments on the battlefields in that vicinity on Thursday of this week. At the unveiling, General Dodge will represent the secretary of war in accepting the monuments for the United States government.

Archbishop Ireland went to Omaha early in the day with the intention of returning to St. Paul later in the day. General Howard left in the morning for Chicago and from there will proceed to his home in Burlington, Vt.

Major George H. Richmond, upon whom a very large share of the work of preparing for the carrying out of the arrangements for entertaining the visitors fell, was feeling the effects of his strenuous labors for the last several weeks and will, in a few days, leave for Hot Springs, Ark., to take a much needed rest.


