HIGGINS IN FOR BURGLARY

Man in Bluffs Jail Confesses to Job Done at Valley, Nebraska.

PART OF STOLEN PLUNDER RECOVERED

Refuses to Tell Who His Accomplices Were or to Admit the Robbery of Cars in Railroad Yards.

James Higgins, arrested by the Council Bluffs police Sunday afternoon as a suspect in being implicated in the robbing of freight cars in the local railroad yards, is now confronted with the charge of breaking into the general store of F. H. Clark at Valley, Neb., last Wednesday night and stealing a lot of goods including underwear, razors, pocket knives, etc.

The goods stolen from the Clark store, which were valued at \$100, were recovered by the police Sunday afternoon. Higgins, who is also known as James Higgins, is said to have confessed to the burglary at the Clark store but so far has refused to disclose the identity of his accomplices, if he had any. The hearing was again continued until this morning.

The goods stolen from the Clark store and which were recovered by the police consist of ten pairs of trousers, six suits of underwear, twenty-five pairs of socks and two dozen suspenders, besides a number of cheap articles of jewelry.

Higgins, alias McGee, is known to the local police, having been arrested last spring while selling phony jewelry here and ordered to leave town.

Frank Smith, another freight car robber suspected of being implicated in the whole theft of shoes from a car in the Union Pacific yards, also continued yesterday until this morning.

MANY PARDON PETITIONS

Legislature Now Has Total of Twenty from Life-Term Convicts. EXCEEDS THE RECORD OF RECENT YEARS

Republican Committee Called for November 20 to Wind Up Affairs of Recent Campaign—Lyons Assistant Attorney.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 13.—(Special.)—Charles Stegal, sentenced to death and later commuted to life imprisonment for the murder of Bill Miller at Davenport, Ia., in a quarrel over the collection of an account of 60 cents, has petitioned to the legislature for a pardon. Stegal was committed to the penitentiary October 20, 1936.

Four other petitions to the legislature for pardons were received in the mail at the governor's office today. L. W. Haley, editor of the Prison Press, published at the Antioch penitentiary, and Hugh Robb, a prisoner in the same penitentiary, were petitioned together from Dubuque county for pardons.

CEDAR FALLS, Ia., Nov. 13.—(Special.)—Three students of the Iowa State Mining college have been in trouble during the past week because of their participation in them for stealing \$500 from the Illinois Central Railway company, and today they were brought before a justice to defend their suit.

Defendant Wins Case. SIOUX CITY, Ia., Nov. 13.—(Special.)—Judge David Mould today decided the \$20,000 breach of promise case brought by Mrs. Vealita Davis against R. E. Purlow, a wealthy bachelor, against the plaintiff, Mrs. Davis brought suit against Purlow last year, but the latter later for some reason came to the court a second time, alleging the acknowledgment of the receipt for settlement to be a forgery. The signature was held valid.

Lyons for Assistant Attorney. C. W. Lyons of Valley Junction will be the next assistant attorney general of the state, succeeding Lawrence DoDraff, who has been elected county attorney of Polk county. Hon. Webb Rivers, recently elected attorney general, gave out in this city today that he would appoint Lyons to the position.

Big Coal Land Deal. Coal operators at Okemo, Buxton and What Cheer have purchased the holdings of the Iowa-Cool Mining company of Des Moines, comprising leases on 1,000 acres on the C. B. & Q. railroad, near Millman station, four miles southwest of Des Moines. The property has only been developed during the last year, and it has prospects which are considered very rich, being underlaid with a vein of coal of high grade, five and a half feet thick. The price of \$50,000 paid for the Iowa company's holdings is considered a bargain.
