TOO BUSY TO SELL THE CORN

Farmers Consumed in Husking and Cannot Go to Market Now.

MUST HUSTLE TO AVOID THE SNOW

Good Time for Railroads to Jump In and Solve the Car Shortage and Coal Problem.

Nebraska farmers are so busy husking their corn they cannot take time to sell any of it. Labor is scarce and every man and boy on the farms must work every day to get the crop harvested before the deep snows come.

Not more than five or six cars a day of new corn are coming to the Omaha market. The grain buyers have bids out, but fail to get acceptances. Representatives of Chicago and St. Louis houses are trying to buy corn for future delivery and are unable to get it in any quantity. The movement is unusually light.

Because the movement has been so late in starting it will come with a rush when it does begin, say local buyers. They fear that the railroads, already hampered by a car shortage, will be unable to handle it. It is expected to begin coming in large quantities in the next two weeks and a veritable flood of the golden grain is expected to flow out of Omaha through the latter half of December.

Owing to the tardiness with which corn is moving as a result of the tremendous crop, it is pointed out, will have less excuse for not hastening to the rescue of coal consumers. Many towns in Nebraska are reported as being destitute of coal and the roads have said they were helpless to relieve the situation because of a car famine. Since they are not obliged to devote a great number of their cars just now to corn hauling, it is said they could jump in and dispose of the coal famine and be amply prepared to meet the demand for cars when the rush came.

Burlington is Helping. General Agent Valley of the Burlington in Denver is in Omaha and says the coal situation should be relieved somewhat if the united efforts of Burlington officials all along the line can do anything for the trouble which now faces the users of coal. He said that during the last three days the Burlington had turned over to the Denver & Rio Grande 971 empty cars at Denver to be taken to the mines.

TOILET SETS—Frescos, Wash, Hair Brushes. TROUBLE OVER TRANSFERS Passenger Entitled to Them Under Law Any Time During the Trip.

These still appear to be doubts in the minds of many street car patrons as to their right in the matter of securing transfers after having paid their fares and not having been asked by the conductors whether they wished transfers. From reports received within the last few days it appears that some of the conductors are failing to determine at the time fare is paid whether passengers want transfers and after this failure in that matter have refused transfers when requested for them by passengers. The ordinance specifically provides that conductors shall offer a transfer when fare is paid and in the event of failing to do so passengers have the right to demand transfers any time during a ride.

S. R. JOHNSON VISITS OMAHA One of the Men Who Came to Nebraska Sixty Years Ago. S. R. Johnson of San Jose, Cal., is in Omaha visiting with his son, Frank B. Johnson of the Omaha Printing company. Mr. Johnson is one of the few men now living who set foot on Nebraska soil as they crossed the Missouri river near Nebraska City in 1847. After a short stay in this territory Mr. Johnson returned to Iowa and returned again to Nebraska in 1854. Mr. Johnson was one of the old time freighters from the Missouri river to California when nearly all the supplies for the mining camps were taken across the continent by ox teams. He also drove cattle from the Missouri river to California for that was the way the mining camps were supplied with their beef in those days.

FINK TO APPEAL THE CASE Treasurer Will Ask Supreme Court to Pass on Tax Certificate.

County Treasurer Fink will appeal to the supreme court from the decision of Judge Troup in which the court had increased bids filed within six months from the date of the sale of the property sold under the agreement. The decision of the court is contrary to the custom which has been in force in the treasurer's office. The decision, which follows the same line as a ruling several days ago on a similar motion, is in the hands of the supreme court. E. Williamson to compel treasurer Fink to deliver him tax certificates in accordance with a bid he made some time ago. Mr. Fink refused because Williamson did not at the time of the bid deposit the money to cover the bid with the treasurer. Judge Troup holds the law does not require such a deposit and that it is to the interest of the county not to require it in order the bidding might be more brisk.
