ARMY GOSSIP IN WASHINGTON. Current Events Glenned from the

Nothing has get been heard in the War department of the new military balloon. which was ordered of a French maker of such vehicles. It is expected that the balloon will soon be ready for shipment although it is destined to arrive too jate fo use in the mobilization maneuvers of the army and militia this year. This is not important, however, since the experimental work with the balloon may just as easily and profitably be conducted at Fort Wood Omaha or Benecia, or any place in the field. There is a preference for California. where the weather generaly is of the sort which does not interfere with military ballooning. The War department is in possession of much information in regard t the work of the Frenchmen and the Germans, who have of late been devoting much time to this subject. There is no fund in this country from which could be borne the cost of experimental work in this line, but with such limited means as the army pos sesses for the investigation and trial the new balloon will be used.

There has been much trouble from time to time respecting the traffic in army uniforms and equipment in citics near the large army posts, and hitherto all efforts to discourage this have been frustrated. A gratifying exception is afforded by the decision of the United States court at peka, Kan., which decision is likely to have wholesome effect. The War department this week was advised that the trials of Patrick Burns and Joe Miller, both citizens of Leavenworth, Kan., for receiving clothing in pledge, has resulted in a fine in each case of \$1,000 and costs.
