To be sure most vomen are a bit afraid of everything that comes in cans, and not without reason, but the reputable grocer has guarded against loss through the new federal pure food law by exacting from the jobbers from whom he buys his canned goods guaranty that it will stand the inspection to be made after the first of the year In this way it has been possible for dealers to carry a grade of goods considerably


