RENDERS NEW BUILDINGS UNNECESSARY

State Superintendent Figures Out Amount Due Different Counties from School Fund Appropriation.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Dec. 5.—(Special.) A resolution will be offered at the next meeting of the State Normal board which, if adopted, probably will make unnecessary the appropriation asked for to increase the capacity of the Kearney Normal school...

School statistics bear out the statement that Kearney is educating its young people in the normal school instead of the local schools. The school census shows 327 children of school age there last year, while the average attendance at the public schools was 1,121 and the enrollment 1,577. This shows that almost half of the school children of that town are being taken care of outside of the public schools...

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NEBRASKA CORN CROP FIGURES

Decrease of Little Over Two Millions Bushels from 1905.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Dec. 5.—(Special.)—According to statistics issued by the state labor bureau today, the total production of corn in Nebraska the present year is 243,308,387 bushels, as compared with 245,324,243 bushels in 1905, or a decrease this year of 2,015,856 bushels. There was a 34.5 per cent increase of acreage of corn this year of 288,413 acres over 1905, but in spite of this the total production of the crop was lessened by a period of dry weather at a critical time in the crop's growth. The average yield of this year was 84.7 bushels per acre, as compared with 87.2 bushels per acre in 1905.

Lancaster county ranks first in acreage with 243,675 acres, and an average yield of 82.3 bushels per acre. Custer county ranks first in production, with 2,521,158 bushels, and Lancaster county takes second place, with 2,517,906 bushels. The total production of 243,308,387 bushels is 2.4 per cent less than that of 1905.

Deaths for Dividing School Fund. The school census, as shown by the reports on file in the office of Superintendent McErlin, gives the number of children of school age in Nebraska as 271,858, and on this basis will the school appropriation be made. The amount to be divided among the various districts is \$21,906.24, giving each district 87 cents for each child of school age. Douglas county's portion will be \$7,127.65, against \$2,304.32 from the last December appropriation.
