Eight Important Measures Will Claim Attention of Hawkeye Solous.

INSURANCE REPORT COMES FIRST

Primary Election Measure, Two-Cent Fare Bill and Uniform System of County Accounts Will Also Come Up.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Dec. 23. - (Special.) -Eight measures, aside from the question of appropriations will consume probably more than half the attention of the Thirtysecond general assembly, which will meet in this city January 14. These measures stated in the order of the amount of time and attention they are likely to command of the legislators are:

The insurance commission report and recommendations. nmendations.
The primary election measure,
The 2-cent fare bill.
The consolidation of the boards of edu-

nal institutions. The indeterminate sentence and state reorm bills.
Uniform system of accounts for counties and inspection of county accounts by the tate auditor's office.
The tenure of office, measure proposing o lengthen terms to four years.
The re-election of Senator Dolliver.

The anti-lobby bill might be added, but the idea of some of the legislators is ollowed of passing the anti-lobby bill the first week of the session that measure will not consume a great deal of time. Probably if the aggregate time which the egislators are required to give to any one neasure is considered the woman's suffrage resolution should be placed at the read of the list, for the women lobbyists for that resolution are probably more active than any other and take more of the time of the legislators, but the time given the measure in the committees and

The seven states in which the legislature does not meet till 1908 are: Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Vermont, Ohio and Virginia. All the others

The fact that the legislature was in session for thirteen weeks during the first four months of this year and that only about eight months have elapsed between the time the last legislature adjourned and the next one will neet is no evidence that the coming session will be a short one. Thirty-Nine Legislatures convene next month, If inity-one of them pass a resolution asking the congress to call a constitutional convention the question of electing United States senators by direct vote of the people would be brought to a focus at once.
