BIG INCREASE IMMIGRATION Arrival of Aliens Exceeds Those of Previous Year Over Hundred Thousand.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(Special.)—The fiscal year ending Jan. 31, 1907, produced a record of immigration, according to the annual report of Frank Sargent, commissioner general of immigration.

During the fiscal year 1906 the department rejected 11,400 aliens and during the last year 12,432 of the immigrant aliens; that is, those who intended settling in the United States.
