PEOPLE GO ON ALL FOURS

Pedestrians Get Back to Primitive State Walking on Knees.

HORSES HAVE STILL HARDER TIME

Humane Society Officials Are Busy and Order Frighty Teams Unhitched and Sent to Be Shod.

The sleet which covered the city Monday caused considerable inconvenience to pedestrians and horses. People were alighting around town like trying to walk in a dignified manner and transact business at the same time. Most of the downtown pavements were early covered with sawdust and ashes and along about noon the heat from the buildings melted the icy coating and relieved the situation.

The humane society officers were unusually busy. Superintendent Ellison was assisted by Officers Clauson and Woodruff and George A. Danforth in the protection of horses. Mr. Ellison reported at noon that the society had caused fifty teams to be unhitched and sent to blacksmith shops, while in some instances shoes were removed from horses and sacking tied on the feet for temporary relief.

Mr. Danforth confined his horse directly to the grade at the Tenth street viaduct and had occasion to shoot one horse which fell and broke a leg. The blacksmith shops had the busiest day of the season. At midnight Sunday rain fell and toward morning the rain was congealed by the cooler air in lower atmosphere. At dawn Mother Earth was ready to receive the children on all fours.

Horses Get It the Worst.

The sleet, which was half an inch thick all over the pavements, was harder on the horses than on the pedestrians. Many teams were started out boldly by their owners, but soon all over the city were to be seen unattached wagons from which the horses had been unhitched and taken to the shoers. Horses stalled on every little incline, for the sleet was firm and refused to yield a footing.

Although all the horses of the Adams Express company were newly shod Friday they were unable to get down the incline to the Burlington station Monday morning and a delay was had until ashes and cinders could be carried for the entire distance.

One driver got stalled on Harney, west of Twenty-fourth. This street was recently paved with asphalt and is without a break on which a horse could hope to catch a

foothold. This driver, when his horse could get no further tied grain sacks over his head, feet and continued his journey.

At 10:30 o'clock no serious trouble was reported by either of the telephone companies or the telephone company, but it was feared some of the lines might fall before evening. The ice appeared to be getting thicker on the wires and with the increasing weight the danger of the wires breaking increased. The lack of wind and sleet decreased the danger of wire troubles.

The Western Union had reports from as far west as Salt Lake City, but no serious trouble was reported at any point and all lines were reported in working order. No sleet was falling at any point.

Milkmen who started out early on their routes had a strenuous time. Some ingenious ones supplied themselves with gunny sacks, with which they bound their horses' feet.

Coal Trust Cases Await Counsel.
Everything is quiet in the Coal trust cases and will remain so until the return of Attorney W. J. Connell from St. Louis, which, Judge Sutton thinks, will be Thursday. Then it is likely the county attorney will be instructed to begin contempt proceedings against the attorney, and following that the Coal trust cases are scheduled to proceed.
