Mr. Kitchen wrote his address last November, after his fatal failing became It is preserved in typewritten form. Copies were given by the author himself to a few perfriends. His natural philosophical turn of mind finds expression in every line of the address, which, in large part, follows:

"Where Life Is, There Death is King," When this paper is read, the golden sunlight that makes human existence possible on this globe, will have become eternal night to me. I shall then have answered nature's last and final call and be sleeping the sleep of the dead. But what kind of sleep that is I do not know.

From a mysterious source life comes to us, unsough, unasked. And in equally mysterious manner it is taken away from us without our permission or approval. I early became thoroughly convinced that it was a serious mitter, if not a real misfortune, to be born into the world.

Here it would seem that death is a blessing, an angel of mercy. But if it really is, why do we shun it so persistently and cling to life so tenaciously? Although I have lived here the full complement of years allotted to man and am grown old and tired of life's contentions, still I do not know why I live or why I should die. Of the future of the dead no one lives long enough to acquire the slightest information. What life really is we do not know and, as to what death is, the dead, if they know, are slient. If we could chose, between life and death, however, only a few of us would be dying—not many would exchange the sentient life in a beautiful sunlit world like this for an eternity of unvaciousness in a dark and lonesome spaye.

It may be, as some people hold, that

that a future life is a moral certainty, that death is a blessing—the beginning of a happier life. But they cannot advance one philosophic reason for holding to such a faith. Of course, we all wish and hope that such is the case. But wishing and hoping will never make it so. Nature will not change her established methods to meet the wishes and varying beliefs of mankind. If she has ordained that we shall live again, we will, regardless of what we believe or disbelieva. There are thousands of honest and olever men and women who prefer to believe in a future life. And this belief, hope, delusion or superstition, whatever it is, is as old as the hills, but is it true? Regarding death a great author says:

"Suppose after all, that death does end all. Next to eternal joy, next to being forever with those we love and those who have loved us, is to be wrapped in the dreamless draperies of eternal peace. Next to eternal life is eternal death. Upon the shadowy shore of death the sea of trouble casts no wave. Eyes that have been curtained by the everlasting dark will never know again the touch of tears. Lips that have been touched by the eternal silence will never utter another word of grief. PAVING PLANT PAYS FOR SELF Thousand, Five Hundred Dol-

lars in Two Years. Chemist Kirschbraun of the city engineering department has made up a report of the operations of the city paving repair plant for 1906. According to the report rendered, the plant, which cost \$12,500, has paid for itself in two years, this being based on what the city paid in two years for repairing the pavements and what the contractors usually charged for such work There were 27,440 square yards of pavement repaired by the plant during 1906, at a cost of 90% cents per yard, making allowance for a depreciation of 15 per cent in the plant and for interest and maintenance. The contractors charged from \$1.39 to \$1.30 for this class of work. There were added during the year equipment costing \$375.84 and maintenance and repairs in the

Local Grain Man Elaborates on Methods Employed at St. Louis Which Involve Omaha Interests.

"Trenmore Cone told the truth in Linoln Thursday when he said St. Louis is practicing a system of false grading in order to entice Nebraska grain business away from Omaha," said a local grain man Friday. Though Mr. Cone spoke of something about which he knew nothing when he said Tuesday, he believed the principles of the old Nebraska Grain Dealers' association to be still in operation in this state, he seems to be well informed on St. Louis inspections.

"Early in the corn shipping season the St. Louis market grades high in order to get a big volume of business. The same and another in Kansas City, Mo. corn that would run No. 4 in Omaha runs when none of it should grade that high, on exchange's inspection department.
