### BOARD DISMISSES CHARGES

Police Commission Annuls Complaints of Federation Against Donahue.

DAHLMAN STILL INSISTS HE IS "IT"

Mayor Declines Power Over Chief and Declares He Does Not Propose Police Shall Enforce Somb Law.

Charges filed by the Civic Federation against Chief of Police Donahue were dismissed Monday afternoon by the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners, on the grounds that the chief issued his orders to his department on a misunderstanding, that he rescinded those orders and was now seeing that the Sunday saloon closing law was being enforced. The board's finding was:

In relation to the charges against the chief of police by the Civic Federation, the board finds that the failure to enforce the law by the chief of police was due to a misunderstanding, as to his duty and that he has since enforced the law and stated that he intends to do so in the future and accepting this statement as made in good faith, the charges are hereby dismissed.

After the reading of the finding of the board by Mayor Dahlman the mayor had this to say:  
"I voted to dismiss charges, but hold the chief is absolutely bound to enforce orders given by the mayor rather than this board. I gave the orders to the chief because I believe an overwhelming majority of our citizens are in sympathy with my stand on this matter. I don't propose to have the police used to see whether people are selling liquor on Sunday when the police are needed for other purposes."

Thomas is Silent.  
After the board rendered its decision Attorney Thomas E. Thomas, representing the Civic Federation, left the room without making any further statement. Mr. Thomas would not say what action, if any, the Federation would take in the matter now.

When the meeting to dispose of the charges was called to order a spirited discussion ensued between Attorney Thomas and members of the police board regarding the powers and authority of the police board and the legal and presumable import of the orders issued by chief of police which orders were the grounds on which

the federation filed their charges. Commissioner Spratlan maintained that from a legal standpoint the chief's charges could not be construed as implying that the chief had ordered a violation of the law, as the mere permitting of saloon doors to be open on Sunday need not necessarily mean the honor was sold. Attorney Thomas said he would let his case stand on the written admission of Chief of Police Donahue that the chief acknowledged he labored under a mistake in issuing his orders and had rescinded them and would see the laws were enforced in the future. Mayor Dahlman said he understood the police should be used for what the people paid them for, but did not go into detail as to what the people paid the police department for.

The old question of "good faith" on the part of the federation was brought up between Commissioner Spratlan and resented by Mr. Thomas with some show of spirit. The board still maintained it had no executive authority and was not sworn to see the statutes were enforced.

### CRIME FROM BENEVOLENCE

Actual Stealing is Prompted in Boy by Desire to Give Presents to Others.

An inordinate desire to give presents to his mother and his little brothers and sisters was the undoing of Carl. Carl is an intelligent looking boy of 15 years and was before the juvenile court Monday morning. His father was there, too, and said Carl was a very good boy, that he was industrious and worked on a farm in the summer. The family now lives in Omaha, but lived in Iowa prior to moving here. There Carl took second prize for scholarship of all the pupils in the public schools of the county.

When the family came to Omaha Carl secured a position in a big store. He rose with remarkable rapidity from cash boy to a place in the stock room. His wages were raised twice in a few weeks. Then he began bringing presents home. He said he had found them and in some cases that they had been given to him, being slightly damaged. It was his kind heart that prompted him to crime. He never brought anything for himself, but always for his mother or brothers or sister. Then the store's detectives found out about it and his arrest followed. He denied the testimony of a youth named "Izy," who was his superior in the store, and tearfully contended that he thought he had a right

### MAYOR VETOS GRIER PROBE

Dahlman Knocks Resolution Directing Criminal Action Against Ex-Police Court Clerk.

Mayor Dahlman has vetoed a concurrent resolution adopted last Tuesday evening by the city council, directing the city attorney to proceed against Lee Grier, former clerk of the police court, and his bondsmen for an alleged shortage of \$3,173.54, and to confer with County Attorney English in the matter of criminal action. The resolution will be presented to the council Tuesday evening and, members believe, undoubtedly will be adopted, the mayor's action notwithstanding.

The mayor contends and has contended all along that the check made by Comptroller Lobeck in the police court matter would not prove convincing to a jury, should the case be brought to trial. On the other hand, the council majority is with the comptroller, who is ready to back up his checking in court.  
It was the mayor's plan when he recommended the employment of an expert accountant at a rate of \$750 per day that that person check up all the city accounts, but the accountant's services were dispensed with by the council without consulting Mayor J. W. Thomas. Grier, former clerk of the police court, was arrested and had something of a controversy with the comptroller over the accounting system applied by Mr. Lobeck.
