

City to Buy Fire Steamer.

At the suggestion of Chaiman Younkerman of the committee on fire and light the city clerk was instructed to advertise for bids for a "first-class steamer" as an adjunct to the equipment of the fire department. Regarding the question of funds with which to purchase a steamer and to maintain it, the finance committee made the following report last night:

the following report last night: If the revenues are allowed to be kept up for the balance of the ficcal year in the same proportion they have been for the last nine months, it is possible there will be by April 155,000 available for this pur-pose. As to the ability of the city to main-tain said steamer after same is purchased, it would depend entirely upon the revenue received from licenses, fines, etc., in the years to come. If said revenues continue as they are today, with a possible slight reduction in the expenses of some other de-partments and without further increase in some, we might possibly meet the extra expense of a steamer to the extent of \$2,600 per annum, the amount required to maintain same. Iowa Farm Abandoned.

Abandoned farms in Iowa is a condition that actually confronts the legislature, according to Prof. P. G. Holden, who is here to interest the legislature in the matter. He told members today that there are big farms in the northern part of the state that the owners have been forced to abandon because of the spread of quack grass. This grass spreads not, by seed alone, but mostly by root and a cultivator running through a plant only scatters the grass more widely, and every separate piece

starts a new plant. The owners of the farms and others in the northern part of the state that are bothered are imploring the Agricultural college for help. The college has come to the legislature to ask it to take measures against the

spread of the plant.

AGED WOMAN IS BURNED TO DEATH

Son Leaves Her Fifteen Minutes and

Returns to Find Her Dead. ATLANTIC, Ia., Jan. 28.-(Special.)--Mrs. Nancy Whitney of Massena was burned to death in a fire that but slightly damaged her home. She was 87 years of age and had been living alone save for the time her son, W. S. Whitney, stayed with her. Yesterday he left the house for about fifteen minutes and when he returned found it full of smoke. He rushed to where his mother had been and found her charred body. He carried it to the back door when he was overcome by the smoke. When neighpors extinguished the flames in the house that had burned some of the furniture and two small holes in the floor, she was dead. All her outer garments had been burned from her body and her arms and legs were literally roasted. How the accident happened is not known, but it is supposed she

attempted to stir the fire, which was low and that her clothes caught in the flames.
