COMPLETED ACROSS OLD MEXICO NOW

Ambassador Comes to Omaha to Attend Annual Meeting of the Columbia Fire Insurance Company,

"The Tehuantepec railroad across Mexico is completed, and has more business than it can handle," said D. E. Thompson, ambasesdor to Mexico, who was in Omaha Wednesday to attend the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Columbia Fire Insurance company, of which he is prest-

"This will not interfere at all with the business of the new Panama canal when it is completed, but both will have all they can do, and another canal will be needed

in a few generations.
"I attended the opening of that road and also went with President Roosevelt to Panama on his recent visit. The Tehuantepec railroad is 225 miles long and has cost 85,000,000. It was built by an English contractor, and with wharves at each end was to cost \$110,000,000. Of this \$85,000,000 has been expended and the remainder will be used in building wharves. The business from the start is so enormous that double tracking will be necessary as soon as possible, and this will make the entire cost

"When the road was completed there were already two boats, one at each end of the road, ready to have their cargoes transported across. Before these were cared for two more boats appeared unannounced and had to be cared for. A boat of 10,000 tons will fill 300 cars, and the road cannot now accommodate the business which is dumped at its two terminals,

Reasons for Its Success.

There are three reasons why this road is going to be a great success. The railroads in the United States cannot now handle the traffic which is billed across the continent. The freight charge is less by water and the Mexican railroad than across the United States, and they will handle time freight in much less time than it can be hauled across this continent. They agree to take freight from New York to San Francisco in sixteen days, or guarantee thirty days, while the average time by way of rail is forty days.

"When Pearson, the English contractor, took hold of this road it was simply two streaks of rust and not a tie was in proper shape, although each tie represented the life of a man. The health conditions are now as good as are those of Omaha and the operation of the road does not mean the loss of human life.

"On the Pacific side is a continuous wind and dust storm most of the year, with little rain, and this condition prevails to the divide, about seventy-five miles from the Pacific ocean. The divide is 763 feet high." Mr. Thompson said he was enjoying the best of health and his looks bore out his

The Lenten season is observed the world over by Roman Catholics and Episcopalians particularly, the observance taking the form of fasting and abstemious living. Bervices are held throughout the season of Lent and in Omaha the various Catholic and Episcopal churches will have the usual

The Lenten season this year will end on Good Friday, March 29, with Easter Sunday ervance two days later, on which latter day the faithful rise to God in grace.

For the guidance of its adherents the Episcopal prayer book notes: "When ye fast, be not, as the hypocrites, of a sad intenance; for they disfigure their faces that they may appear unto men to fast." The Roman Catholic churches next Wednesday will, as usual, observe the cusiom of sprinkling the ashes of burnt palm leaves upon the penitent. Services will be held every morning and evening in most

of the Episcopal churches. Excluding the Sundays between Asl Wednesday and Good Friday, there are forty days in which to put off worldly things and magnify the spirit. These Sundays are referred to as feast days, while the forty days are fast days.




