Several weeks ago the Chicago, Bock Island & Pacific raflway succeeded in getting the local Chicago-Omaha mail away from the Burlington, bringing the Chicago local mail into Omaha at 7.35 a. m., fifty minutes ahead of the previous time made by the Burlington. The Rock Island has finally reached the conclusion that the investment was not a paying one and hence Rock Island train No. 15 has been withdrawn to take effect Pobruary 15, and the mail contract goes back to the Burlington, as before, the train reaching here at \$120 a. m.
