JAPS DISLIKE NEW BILL

Restriction of Immigration Not Pleasing to Subjects of Mikado.

OFFICIAL JAPAN IS NOT NOW EXCITED

San Francisco Islanders Make Strong Appeal to Native Rulers to Protest Against the Pending Legislation.

TOKIO, Feb. 12.—(Afternoon)—The projected amendments to the American immigration law involving a restriction upon Japanese labor immigration to the United States from the Hawaiian islands are naturally received here with great displeasure.

Situation Not Understood. The relations between the federal government at Washington and the governments of the various states of the union are not well understood here and a restriction of the admission into the face of the treatment of which the Japanese in San Francisco complain.

Mayor Schmitz Talks. WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The California delegation, which came here to confer with the president on the Japanese question, has not conceded any of its rights.

PATTON CALLED BY DEFENSE

Head of Princeton Theological Seminary May Testify for Harry Thaw.

FIGHT AGAINST INSANITY COMMISSION

Attorneys for Thaw Will Do All in Their Power to Keep Special Body from Considering Case.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—Funeral services for Mrs. Joseph B. Bolton, wife of one of the jurors in the Thaw trial, were held today.

Thaw has had a long conference with A. Russell Peabody, one of his counsel, regarding the reports that District Attorney Jerome was paying the way to apply for a commission in lunacy.

"Counsel for the defense," said Mr. Peabody, "will fight in every way possible any attempt that the district attorney may make for a special commission."

The names of two new probable witnesses have been made public. One is Dr. Francis L. Patton, president of Princeton Theological seminary, the other is Dr. Frank P. McGuire, the Tomba physician.
