Says His Own Money and that of the Company Went in Speculation-Desires to Pay Penulty and Refleve His Mind.

Charles A. Cook of this city, formerly cashier of the Acme Harvesting Machine company, Ninth and Jackson streets, Omaha, who abscended on the night; of November 28, with \$1,237 of the company's money, has returned. He arrived in Coucil Bluffs yesterday afternoon unheralded

and unexpected even by his wife. To a reporter for The Bee who met him, Cook anid: "I have come back of my own free will

When I left Omaha in Novem-Sylva May, infant daughter of Mr. and ber, my only idea was to get as far away yesterdiny at Mercy hospital, ioliowing an operation for appendicitle. She was 2 years and 16 months of age. most anything might have happened. did not really come to myself until I had been in Galveston two or three days. have a faint recollection of stopping in Kansas City a part of a day. I stayed in Galveston until I got over my nervousness and then, for the first time, realised my situation For a week before the crisis came I was on the verge of a physical and mental collapse, not so much from fear of punishment as from shame. I have been In the south ever since I went away, and have now come back to make what amends I can. I am here to take my medicine, no matter how bitter it is.

"I am on my way to see my wife now, and then will telephone Mr. Olson, manager of the Acme company, and do whatever he says. All the money I had and that which belonged to the company went to feed the frenzied financiers and now, its up to the people I wronged to say what shall be done with me."

A warrant for Cook's arrest was issued from the court of Justice Cockrell in Omaha on the complaint filed by the local representative of the bonding company which was surety for Cook.
