NEWS FROM THE ARMY POSTS

Indoor Sports Serve to While Away the Time of Enlisted Men.

OPPONENT TO BRIDGE WHIST AT RILEY

Women Who Do Not Play Organize "Bridget" Club Intended to Persuade the Members in the Culinary Art.

Fort Crook, Neb., Feb. 15.—(Special.)—Captain Waldo E. Ayer, adjutant, Thirtieth infantry, has been ordered to report to Fort Leavenworth, Kan., for examination for promotion to the rank of major. Second Lieutenant A. L. Clark, Thirtieth infantry, has also been ordered to Leavenworth for examination for promotion to first lieutenant.

First Lieutenant W. A. Carleton, Thirtieth infantry, has been ordered to proceed to Governor's Island, New York, to appear as a witness before a general court martial now in session at that post, trying a case of desertion against Private Charles St. Clair, who deserted from the Philippine Islands in 1905, and who was arrested in New York while displaying his pugilistic ability in the ring.
