Collier Place and Monmouth park, not far south of Fort Omaha, will be expiolted this year by Hastings & Heyden, whose syndicate last week bought through the Byron Reed company 168 lots in these two additions from the estate of George B. Collier, the Philadelphia publisher. #About \$30,000 is said to have been involved in the transaction. The syndicate will park the land, lay sewers and sidewalks and build several houses before offering the lots for sale. Development in Collier Piace and Monmouth park has been at a standstill for years, the owners, after seeing a depreciation during the financial degression, having allowed taxes to accumulate and having offered little of the property for sale. The lots were cleared of taxes under the souvenger law.

Garden tracts at the terminals of the street railway lines will become more valuable if the street rallway company adopts the plan suggested by the newly organized Omaha Fruit Growers' associa-The fruit growers and gardeners want the company to place cars at night at the end of the Benson, Florence, Omaha and South Omaka lines, to be loaded at night or early in the morning with fruit and produce for the markets of the city.
