REVIEW OF THE NEW BOOKS

Work of Burbank, the "Plant Wizard," Eagerly Sought for Abroad.

BOOK BEING TRANSLATED INTO GERMAN

March Magazines Offer an Unusually Attractive Selection of Matter, Covering an Exceptionally Wide Field.

Luther Burbank has achieved fame that is literally almost world-wide, and the authoritative account of his work contained in W. E. Harwood's "New Creations in Plant Life," published by Macmillans, has recently been announced that a number of translations of this book are to be made.

The German translation, which will probably appear first, will be by Alois Wuerstner, editor of the Deutsche Illustrierten Gartenzeitung, and a man of large scientific training and attainments. An Italian edition of the same book will be issued under the auspices of the Societa degli Agricoltori Italiani in the most important agricultural association in Italy. The book was adopted for translation by this society because of its educational value.

Professor E. W. Hilgard, the author of the important treatise on "Soils," published by The Macmillan Company, is an entirely practical agriculturist. His position as professor of agriculture in the University of California and director of the California Agricultural Experimental Station, is something more than a mere scholastic distinction. In his official capacity he has been repeatedly consulted as to the merits and adaptations of various soils. His book is the direct outcome of his experience in this direction. It is designed primarily as a text-book, but the author has also had in view the practical need of farmers for a convenient comprehensive reference work on this subject, and it is quite possible that the book will find its largest usefulness in this field.
