CONFESSION OF STEVE ADAMS

Statement Made to Detective and Warden Admitted in Evidence.

Tells of Plot to Kill Steuenerberg

Fred Tyler and Another Alleged Timber Claim Jumper Killed by Adams, Glover and Simpson.

WALLACE, Idaho, Feb. 23.—The story of the plot to assassinate ex-Governor Steuenerberg was today read to the jury which is trying Steve Adams for the murder of Fred Tyler. Adams' confession states that he joined the Western Detective Agency at Cripple Creek; that he knew Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone; that Pettibone told him to go to Idaho and see Simpkins, that Pettibone went to Idaho and got \$200 for his expenses; that the manner of "getting" Steuenerberg was left to him; that he went to Idaho and met Simpkins and they planned the crime.

Following is the substance of the confession of Steve Adams, alleged to have been made Tuesday, November 27, 1904, at the office of the warden of the Penitentiary in the presence of Pinkerton Detective James McFarland and his stenographer, George Hubner. The confession, which was witnessed by Warden Whitney, was read by McFarland this morning: "Where did you come from when you went to Oregon? " "I want you to be as particular as possible. When did you talk about the assassination of ex-Governor Steuenerberg? " "Shortly after I saw Simpkins. It was shortly after the dynamiting of the depot at Independence, in July, 1904, I think."

VIOLATED SECOND JUDGE

Munger Not to Have Walkway in His Effort to Land Place.

Burlington is busy in his behalf if the Lincoln Man Lands the Place He Can Credit It Up to Work of Burkett on Remainder of Delegation.

(From a Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—(Special Telegram.)—If the individual sense of the Nebraska delegation could be obtained as to the choice of an additional judge for the federal district of Nebraska it would be against T. C. Munger of Lincoln, said a member of the delegation. "I am convinced that there is but one man on the delegation who goes down in his heart in favor of Mr. Munger, and he is Senator Burkett."

REMOVING CLAIM JUMPERS.

He told me that he did. He asked me to wait until he went and got it. He said nothing as to the manner in which we were to remove Steuenerberg. He gave us no directions. It was understood that I was to use my own judgment and Pettibone told me about Simpkins' wanting to see me before I received the money. I did not see Haywood after I received the money. Simpkins said that he would write back that day for the money and then we would go down on the Steuenerberg case. He wrote to Denver, but I do not know if he got the money or not. Pettibone told me afterward that the money was sent to the wrong address. After I got to the timber claim I met some settlers, one named Mason and another named Rice. He is the one known as "Walt Eyer." I also met a man by the name of Glover. There were some claim jumpers there. Simpkins told me that he wanted to get rid of those fellows and that if I did so he would give me \$500.

HOW TYLER WAS KILLED.

"Two men got killed. Meut Glover, Simpkins and myself assisted in the killing. Tyler was the first man killed, and I killed him with a rifle. We went down to the miner's cabin and he was not there. We stayed around all day and then went out on the trail. We stopped at a spring and I heard some one coming. I said 'all right, I am glad of it.' " "We hid behind some trees, and I saw that it was Tyler coming. He had a big gun tucked on and I told him to hold up his hands. One of the boys took his gun and we took him to Simpkins' cabin and kept him till morning and then took him three miles out on the trail and I killed him. Three of us were together all the time. After the killing the body was left behind the tree. Tyler always refused to say where he came from, but said that a man by the name of Lewis, a Spokane man, had placed him on the claim. " "After the killing I went down to Harrison and met Simpkins and I told him what I had done and said that he did not want me to get out on the trail. He said that he would not get out on the trail for a while and then go back and get the rest of the fellows on the other claim."

ANOTHER MAN KILLED.

"In about a week or thereabouts we went back up there and met a fellow by the name of Boule. There was Jack Simpkins, Meut Glover and myself. There was another man whose name I do not remember. We met the man on the trail and Simpkins and Glover killed him. Mason was not there. We shot at the man with Boule, but missed him. After that we went back to Glover's cabin and Simpkins went to Mason's cabin to get the rest of the fellows on the other claim. He said that he would not get out on the trail for a while and then go back and get the rest of the fellows on the other claim."

MORMONS IN SWITZERLAND

Women Said to Be Sent to Salt Lake and Then Deserted. GENEVA, Feb. 23.—(Special.)—The police departments of the cantons of Berne and Thurgovie have issued warnings advising the people not to emigrate to Salt Lake City. Mormon missionaries have obtained many converts, almost exclusively of young girls, in these two cantons. It is said, and letters which have been received from some of these girls confirm, that the girls belong to the First South Dakota regiment of volunteers, which, under Colonel Frost, fought so desperately at Marjarae.

RAILROAD BILL IS AMENDED

House Gives Substitute for LaFollette Measure Right of Way.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—Under a rule reported from the committee on rules by Mr. Dabell of Pennsylvania, the house today amended its substitute for the LaFollette 16-hour railroad employes' bill by an affirmative vote of 273, there being no negative votes cast. Both republicans and democrats agreed that the amendments made to the bill strengthen it greatly and it would be more satisfactory to the president.

The most important amendment adopted by the house is the elimination of the word "knowingly" wherever it occurs, which has the effect of relieving the railroads of responsibility for overwork unless it is permitted or required with the knowledge of railroad management that an employe had worked overtime. Another amendment strikes out the provisions in the section regulating employment, which reads: "Unless immediately prior to said twenty-four-hour period such employe had at least eight consecutive hours of duty and during said period of twenty-four hours following had at least six consecutive hours of duty."

HABEAS CORPUS FOR PRICE

United States Circuit Court of Appeals Will Review Case from China. SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 23.—The United States circuit court of appeals has issued a writ of habeas corpus in the case of H. P. Price in prison at Shanghai. Price was convicted on January 15 by Judge Whitley of the United States court for China at Shanghai of assault with a deadly weapon and sentenced to six months in jail.

DEATH RECORD.

Mrs. K. P. Mass. SILVER CITY, Ia., Feb. 23.—(Special.)—The people of Silver City were shocked to learn of the sudden death last evening of Mrs. K. P. Mass, aged 77 years, which occurred about 5 p. m. Friday. Mrs. Mass had been in her usual health and was engaged in preparing supper for herself and husband. Mr. Mass had been outside the door when he came in and found her lying on the floor near the fireplace. He picked her up and tried to revive her, but she was dead. The funeral will be held at the residence Saturday afternoon and burial took place in the Silver City cemetery.

REPORT ON BLOCK SIGNAL SYSTEM

Commissioner Would Have Roads Given Time to Adopt Plans. WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The Interstate Commerce commission today sent to the senate an elaborate report concerning the block system made of the workings of the block system to prevent railroad accidents. The commission recommends the passage of a bill which it submitted a year ago that would compel all railroads to the present system and now suggests that the time for compliance be extended three or four years. The report estimates it would take from one to three years for all roads to equip with the block system.
