An overwhelming majority of the Cubans themselves demand the right to fight their chickens as they have done for several years, even since the application of the Wood decree, though the sport has been necessarily conducted landestinely. It was the arrest of a number of prominent Cubans, including at least one presidential candidate, for tending a cock fight, that brought on the crisis and caused Governor Magoon to promise that he would consider the petitions that were presented, asking for the abrogation of the decree. Nearly all the planters prefer cock fighting, according to

hose who have recently been in Cuba. When the sport flourished, the Cuban laborer worked four days a week to support his family. Another day's wages he set apart for the lottery and the last of the secular days he worked in order that he might secure funds to back his favorite eack in the pit.
