Close Observation Enabled a Keen Lawyer to Score with the Jury.

A number of years ago General Benjamin F. Butler was a guest of friends in Brooklyn. During his visit he noted the rule of the street railway companies compelling conductors to register fares as soon as passengers entered the cars and before the fares were actually collected. Two or three years afterward he represented the plaintiff in a damage suit for \$15,000 in which a Brooklyn street railway company was the defendant. The principal witness for the company was the conductor of the car on which the accident occurred and his estimony was so strong as to make things look bad for Butler's client. But Butler recalled the unusual rule he had remarked years before and on cross examination he

"Your company requires you to ring up fares as soon as passengers enter the car, doesn't it?"

and then finds he is on the wrong line, do you state that fact to your superiors, and they make allowance on your returns for that fare?"

"No. I lose the nickel." "Do you mean to say the company won't take your word for five cents?" "No, they won't."

"Yet," said the shrewd veteran, turning to the jury, "the company asks you to take this conductor's word for \$15,000. Butler's client received a verdict .- Brook
