Harold Woodbridge has returned from Chicago and is staying at Prof. W. E. Leonard's.

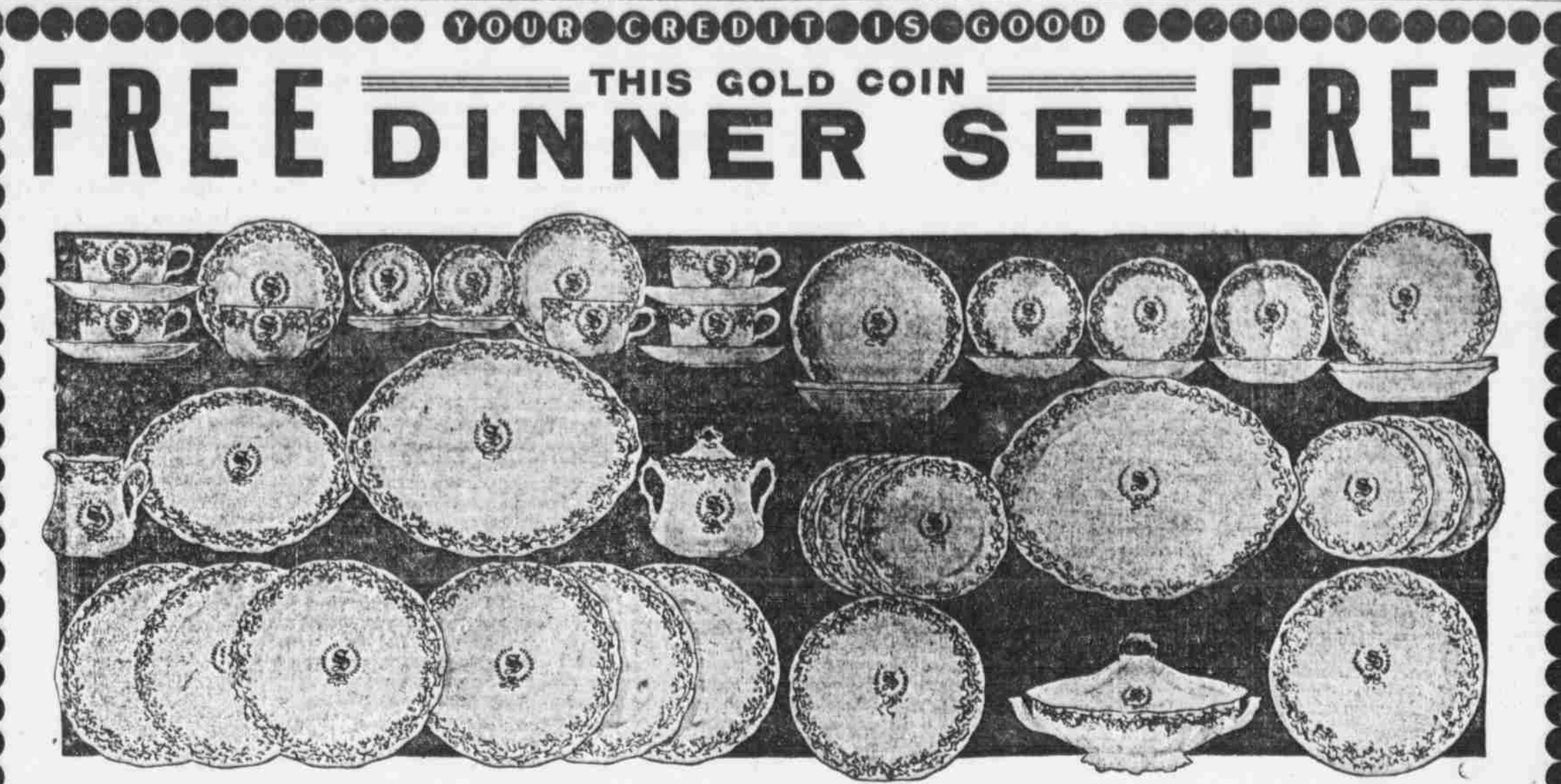
Newton Rice, a Junior in the college, left last Monday for Colorado to hold office in that state.
