The written examination for summer work will be given at the superintendent's office the first week in September, and a per cent of 85 must be attained. Before the examination shall be given for the work done cutside of school a certificate shall be furnished the superintendent showing that the work of the quarter has been carefully studied under the direction of some competent person. Examinations may be given at the close of each semester and the first week in September.




